because God, not fear, is in charge of our lives!

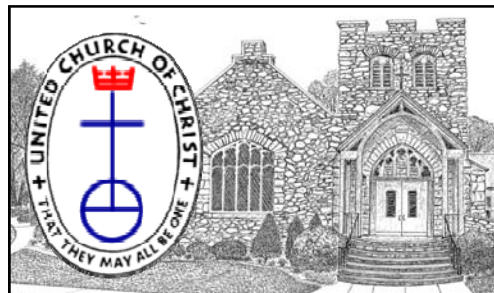

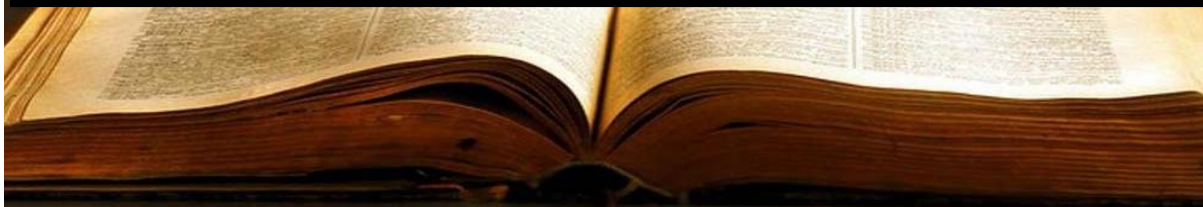

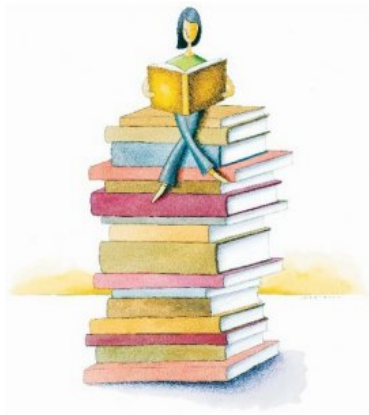

Centering Prayer

Experience God's presence within us.

Centering Prayer is a method of silent prayer that prepares us to receive the gift of contemplative prayer, prayer in which we experience God's presence within us, closer than breathing, closer than thinking, closer than consciousness itself. This method of prayer is both a relationship with God and a discipline to foster that relationship.

Centering Prayer is not meant to replace other kinds of prayer. Rather, it adds depth of meaning to all prayer and facilitates the movement from more active modes of prayer — verbal, mental or affective prayer — into a receptive prayer of resting in God. Centering Prayer emphasizes prayer as a personal relationship with God and as a movement beyond conversation with Christ to communion with Him.

The source of Centering Prayer, as in all methods leading to contemplative prayer, is the Indwelling Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The focus of Centering Prayer is the deepening

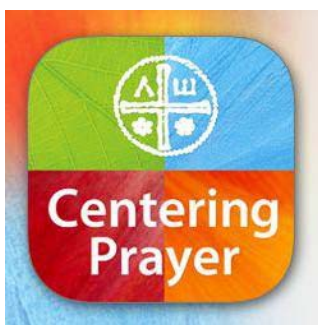
of our relationship with the living Christ. The effects of Centering Prayer are ecclesial, as the prayer tends to build communities of faith and bond the members together in mutual friendship and love.

Centering Prayer Class Thursday November 10, 2016 at 6:30 pm

Pastor Rick King will be teaching a Centering Prayer class for anyone interested in learning this ancient Christian prayer form which resembles meditation, .

Rick first learned the method over 40 years ago, when he was 12, and is excited to share it with our congregation as part of helping us open ourselves to the

Board of Outreach

On October 14 and 15 our group of intrepid workers, Barney, Doug, Miles, George, Brian, Bill, Manfred and Mike put in more than 40 hours of labor to work on a major repair job on a trailer home in Mill Spring. As with many of these types of projects it is not just a coming together of skills and experiences that help accomplish the task but it is also an experience where everyone involved is in some way affected by the reality of poverty and hopelessness that is all around us.

Christian Education invited Karen Dacey, Program Coordinator for Big Brothers Big Sisters, to Fun and Learning on October 19. Our recent donation to BBBS makes us sponsors for their big fundraiser “Bowl for Kids’ Sake” but more importantly it helps support their youth mentoring program. As Karen explained the program matches children ages 6 – 14, the “Littles” with adult mentors, the “Bigs.” The outcomes for the children are evident in improved academic performance, motivation to learn, problem solving skills and self-confidence and for many of the adult mentors it becomes a lasting and loving relationship. There is a long waiting list for mentors and funds are always appreciated.

Roseland Fundraiser was on October 22. Several people donated items to the sale. Although it was another busy Saturday with much going on in the community several members of our congregation showed up, did a little shopping, enjoyed a delicious lunch and met new friends. For some it was their first visit to the East Side.

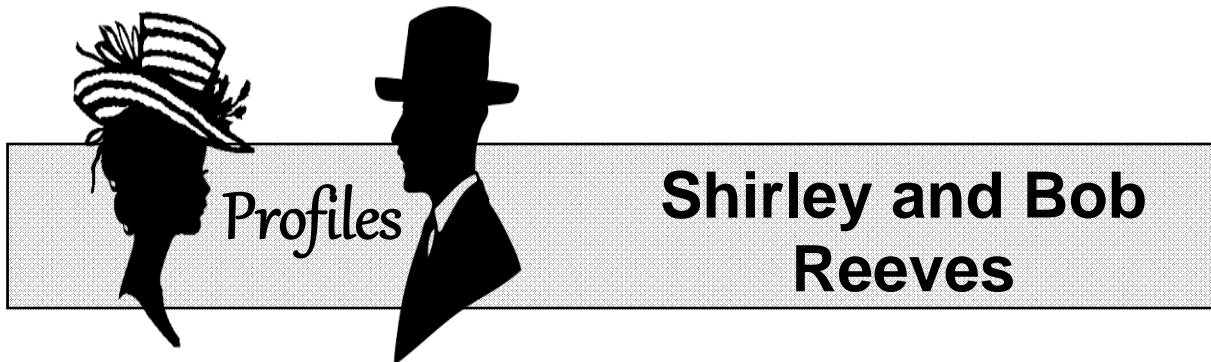


Upcoming Happenings:

They met at a “Sunday Nighter” at Bryn Mawr Community Church in Chicago where they both were members. Shirley had been a happy single woman for a few years after attending University of Iowa, loving Chicago and working as an industrial psychologist at Stevens, Thurow & Associates. Bob lived nearby and worked in industrial engineering at Republic Steel. They were married in Iowa City, Iowa, 64 years ago. The minister at Bryn Mawr Community Church even helped them find a place to live in the South Shore of Chicago.

Shirley Harper, from a family of three generations of Methodist ministers, was born in Boston, grew up in the mid-west, and spent her high school years in Iowa City where her father had become Director of the School of Fine Arts at the University of Iowa. Shirley always sang in church choirs, often as a soprano soloist. Her parents, Earl and Clara, were also professional musicians. Bob was born in Weldon, Illinois, on a grain farm. He was baptized in the Church of the Brethren there and later became a Methodist. His father died when he was eight months old leaving his mother, Cassie, to tend to and feed four children, ages 8 months to eight

years. Indeed she did. Bob covets a plaque he has honoring his mother: “Cassie Cross Reeves, 1957 Mother of Illinois, by The American Mothers’ Committee.” Shirley says Cassie was an neat lady.

It was the beginning of WWII; life’s choices were uncertain. From a class of 19 high school graduates in Weldon, Bob went on to Navy boot camp in Florida, then to an aviation machinists’ school and a gunnery school, both in Oklahoma. Too much shooting without ear protection left him nearly deaf in one ear. He spent one year at Cal Tech but moved to try pre-med at the University of Illinois in Champaign-Urbana. Industrial engineering became his field, and that’s where he succeeded throughout his career in Chicago, Des Moines at Frye Manufacturing Company, then Dayton, Ohio, for almost 30 years at Standard Register Forms. Shirley was very active with the children and their schools in Dayton, and in the social services branch of United Way; Bob served on a few boards as well.

All three Reeves children were born in Des Moines – Roger, Philip and Elizabeth (Libby) – and now live hither and yon. Roger is in

Annapolis, Maryland, Philip in Haines, Alaska, and Libby in San Mateo, California. There are two step-grandsons. All offspring and their spouses have always been productive and talented individuals with which Shirley and Bob are very, very pleased.

It was having a time-share at Lake Lure that brought the Reeves to our Foothills area. Their purchase of a house on Hogback Mountain Road came later in 1991, where Dick (Bob's brother) and Joyce Reeves had a house across the street. In 2006, Shirley and Bob moved to Tryon full time and enjoyed the incredible view from Hogback. In 2011, a villa at Tryon Estates caught their eye. There is an original Grant Wood on their walls, Fertility, and a print, Stone City. Apparently, Mr. Wood drove Shirley's father crazy in Iowa City at one point, and this artwork was a peace offering! Ask her.
